

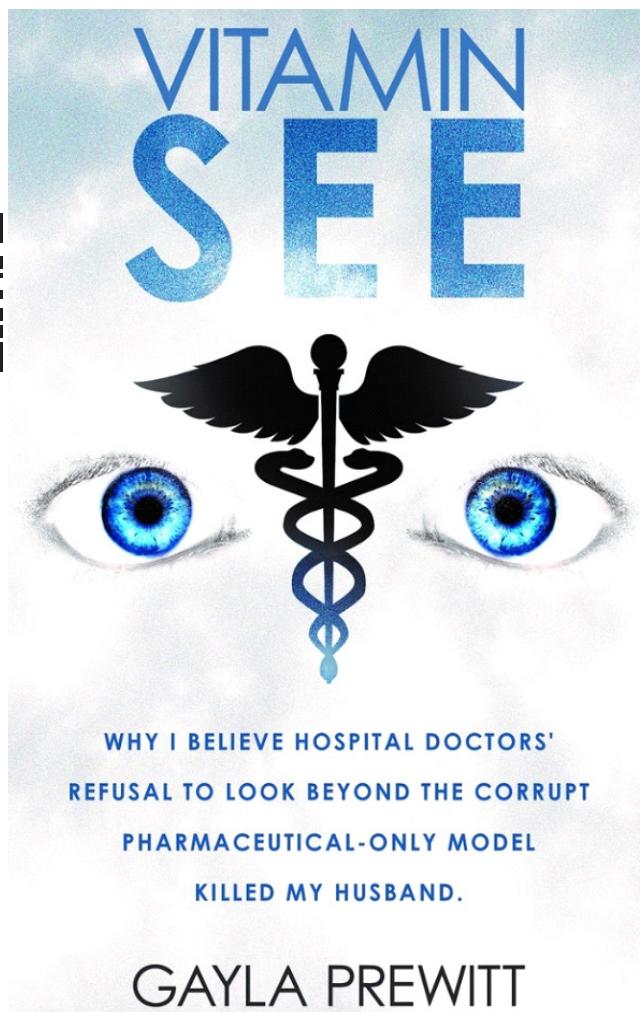
Christian Author Calls for a Congressional Investigation into Possible Death Protocols at U.S. Hospitals

BOLIVAR, Mo., April 11, 2023 /Christian News-wire/ -- "My heart is breaking for somebody who didn't get to be a part of the medical decision-making for her husband. This should not be happening in America!" said registered nurse Priscilla Romans in an emotional video appeal for prayer. Romans, founder of the patient advocacy agency Graith Care, left mainstream hospital practice after becoming disillusioned with the system and witnessing the loss of patient rights. The wife, Romans mentions, is just one of many clients across the U.S. represented by the advocacy service.

"They removed the ventilator without (the wife's) consent," added Romans. "They're giving IV fentanyl medication that she asked not to give. The nurse proceeded to give it because the doctor told her to. I am heartbroken right now because I don't know if he is going to survive this. Because they are clearly giving IV medication to hasten his death," said Romans.

Romans' agonizing testimony confirms the suspicions of Christian author Gayla Prewitt, who also believes doctor prescribed IV fentanyl was given to her husband Peter to hasten his death while in a hospital intensive care unit. "After Peter's death, I would uncover information that I believe reveals at some hospitals, protocols have crossed the line all under the guise of compassion and using the term, 'palliative care,'" said Prewitt. In a 2015 article by the Association of American Medical Colleges, Having the Talk: When Treatment Becomes End-of-Life Care, a Stanford Medical School professor mentions how difficult talks about end-of-life-care can be when patients and families have specific religious beliefs. "Some cultures believe that a person should die only by the will of God, and humans shouldn't interfere," said VJ Periyakoil, MD, associate professor of geriatrics, hospice, and palliative medicine at Stanford University School of Medicine. "Others 'pray for a miracle' for a patient



in the ICU when the doctor knows that the treatment is prolonging not the patient's life, but the dying process."

In a 2018 article, Palliative Sedation, an End-of-Life Practice That Is Legal Everywhere, author Michael Ollove states, "Whether palliative sedation hastens death remains an open question. Pain-management doctors say sedation slows breathing and lowers blood pressure and heart rates to potentially dangerous levels." An excerpt from the 2009 New York Times article, Hard Choice for a Comfortable Death: Sedation, adds, "The possibility that the process might speed death has some experts contending that the practice is, in the words of one much-debated paper, a form of 'slow euthanasia,' and that doctors who say otherwise are fooling themselves and their patients."

While the morality of the situations mentioned in the previous articles is debatable, Prewitt adds there is a significant distinction between those situations and the one she and the wife mentioned by Romans faced. In both cases, the decision to give potentially lethal doses of drugs was not made by either patient or their families but forced upon the patients by the doctors and, ultimately, the corporate American medical machine. In Appleton, Wisconsin,

the family of Grace Schara, a 19-year-old woman with Down Syndrome, who died, is suing the hospital there, claiming "hospital medical professionals administered a cocktail of lethal drugs and illegally wrote a 'Do Not Resuscitate' (DNR) order," for Grace. Prewitt adds that hospital records for her husband also list a DNR order that she never agreed to. "You need to understand what is happening in these hospitals has just gone from bad to worse," said Romans. "I believe that we are at a time that I never imagined. All the time I have done advocacy work and my 20-plus advocates at Graith Care, we have seen things we have never seen before."

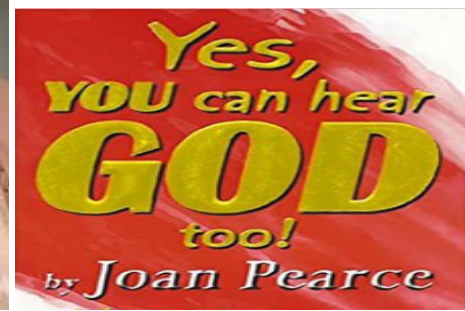
"A week after he entered the hospital, they listed my husband as terminal, all unknown to me at the time," said Prewitt. "After that, his hospital records show there was a steady uptick in the amount of IV fentanyl that he was given," Prewitt believes her husband received potentially lethal amounts as defined by the National Capital Poison Center.

Woman in a Wheelchair

One day during the meetings my husband Marty said, "Why don't you start believing for people to come out of wheelchairs." I agreed with him. So we prayed that God would start bringing people in wheelchairs to our meetings.

At our first morning service the following week, a woman in a wheelchair rolled up to the front. I prayed for her with all my heart. Yet she rolled back to where she had come from. We wanted so much to see her come out of the wheelchair. Our hearts were breaking when we saw nothing had happened. She attended both the morning and evening services that first day.

The second day, she came back and rolled up to the front again. When we prayed for the sick, there were people lying on the floor everywhere, who had fallen out under the power of the Holy Spirit. She sat in her wheelchair in the midst of them.

She came back on the third night. Again the presence of God touched people. Some were on the floor, some were laughing, jumping, singing, and shouting. She had rolled up to the front again and wound up in the middle of all those lying on the floor. She couldn't move the wheelchair anywhere without running over the bodies, so she was kind of stuck in that place.

The service seemed to be coming to a close that night. We were singing praise songs when Marty suddenly came over and whispered in my ear. "Honey, you see that lady over there in the wheelchair?" I said, "Yes," and he said, "Look at her. She's so happy for everyone else who's being healed! She's sitting there with joy all over

her face as she's seeing the people on the floor shaking under the power of the Anointing. She's watching God move in their lives. She's not even thinking about herself in that wheelchair. She's simply enjoying everyone else being blessed by God. I believe the Lord wants you to pray for her now!"

I made my way over to her, took her hand and started praying for her. There was no eloquent prayer. The truth is, I couldn't get a word to come out, not even one. Yet in my heart I kept repeating, "Jesus. Jesus. Jesus."

Suddenly Marty came over. He bent down and lifted the two footrests out of the way. The woman stood up. She just stood up!

She said to me, "Let's walk." She took three or four steps holding my hand. Remember the floor was still covered with those who had fallen under the power of the Holy Spirit. Then she let go of my hand and took off dancing. Without ever stepping on anyone, she spun and stepped around the tent. When she stopped dancing, she began weeping and crying. Then she paused and knelt down before a young girl who was in a wheelchair and began to pray for her.

We learned this woman had been afflicted with hepatitis C. The disease had progressed to a point where she could no longer walk, due to lack of strength in her legs. She had been receiving treatments at the University of Berkeley Hospital in California. Doctors had told her she would die soon if she did not get a new liver.

I simply prayed what God placed on my heart for her, saying, "God give

her a creative miracle." Thursday of that week, she returned to the hospital for scheduled tests. After they'd completed their tests, the doctor told her, "We don't know what's happened to you, but somehow you have a brand-new liver!"

Before she came out of that wheelchair, the woman attended four services and was prayed for at each one. The point is, she heard God tell her "Keep on going," and so she kept on attending services. When God decided it was time, He just pulled her up out of that chair.

She could easily have become discouraged after the first service when we prayed and there were no apparent results. She could have become discouraged the next day and not returned for the other services. But she determined that if she kept coming, God would lift her up and out of that chair. And He did!

I tell you the day is approaching when we will see everybody getting up out of wheelchairs and walking. But this will require not only being ready, willing, and able to hear the voice of the Holy Spirit, but also ready to obey His voice when He speaks.

We need to know the voice of God's Holy Spirit because we are clearly heading into difficult times in this world. God Almighty has given us a mandate from Heaven. He has told us, "Teach My people how to hear My voice, and how to listen and obey the Holy Spirit's voice."

God says His people hear His Voice, and the voice of a stranger they will not follow.
